Round Table Discussion

Join us for a Round Table where you can bring your problem plants. We will have an open discussion about culture, how to grow a plant that someone else is having trouble growing. All of us have problem plants, and at the same time we also have plants we are extremely successful with. This is an opportunity for all of us to learn from each other.

Bring 1 to 3 problem plants, they will be visually checked for insects and signs of virus. Plants will be placed in the center of the room. When we start, plants will then be randomly selected. The grower will then be asked to take a minute or two to describe their growing area and how they water/fertilize, etc. their plant. Members and guests will be asked to describe how they have successfully grown the same plant. This is intended to be an educational fun afternoon where everyone can learn and grow in our orchid knowledge.

The meeting will be organized as follows:

Everyone who brings an orchid will be given a ticket, place you name on half of the ticket and place it in your plant. This is to ensure that at least one plant is discussed from individuals bringing orchids. We will go through all the tickets for at least one plant.

You are invited to bring additional plants, these will receive a second set of tickets. We will do our best to get through all the remaining plants.

Some plants may give the visual impression of a virus or disease. These plants may be isolated or placed in plastic bags.

Bring a note pad to take names and notes on other growers you may want to followup with after the meeting.

Join us for our hands-on Orchid Culture meeting We will have Show and Tell, so bring your blooming plants too!

Speaker's Choice

April speaker Phyllis Prestia selected Jumellea arachnantha, grown by Roberta Fox, as her Speaker's Choice plant. The pristine white flower of this Angraecoid caught her attention. She is particularly fond of this group of orchids, and grows many. It also nicely fit the topic of her talk, since this species is a Madagascan native. Roberta grows this plant in the greenhouse, shady and very humid. Jumelleas can be a little tricky—they seem to be very susceptible to scale infestation. A little bit granular Safari in the pot once or twice a year seems to help keep that under control. (Disclaimer: This is simply an empirical observation, no advice implied)



Along with Madagascar, Jumellea arachnantha is native to the nearby Grand Comoro Island. it occurs at elevations of 4000-

6000 ft (1220-1830 m) according to Charles Baker in Orchidwiz. This would imply that it could grow somewhat cooler, and probably could grow outside very near the coast. Humidity is important, and the greenhouse does offer that advantage even if it is not so necessary for temperature. Like essentially all the Angraecoids, it has a spur, or nectary, just barely visible in the photos. It is fragrant at night, so is no doubt pollinated by a moth.

President's Message

May is a challenging month for the Society Meeting because it occurs on Mothers' Day. I would like to encourage everyone to come out to our meeting; it should be very educational and interactive.

I don't know about you but I hate the Santa Ana winds, even more so because I am an outside orchid grower. In most of our yards we have areas that are in the sun or shade. If we are lucky we have areas that are bright or a mottled sunshade area, perfect for Orchids. The challenge comes when we feel we have created the perfect environment for our prized orchids, then the Santa Ana winds blow. In my yard plants up to 5-gallon size pots are thrown off the benches to the ground with the winds. My recollection is that the Santa Ana winds had a season. It now seems to me they come every few weeks or months throughout the year. So is the problem the wind or the lack of humidity? I know there is wind in the rain forests, but I think the real challenge for us is the lack of humidity. This dry wind is what decimates my plants. A fellow orchid grower of ours has reported to me that he goes outside at 2:00 AM to water when the winds are blowing.

There is an interesting Article titled "Orchids Outdoors in Southern California" it is in the ASO archive written by Susan M. Stephenson Vol. 56, #3 March 1987. Susan does a great job of explaining how to adapt your growing area, planting medium, and pots to deal with changing microclimates in Los Angeles and at the base of the Hollywood Hills.

So the thing about orchids is when we lose one plant it drives us crazy. On the other hand, when we have orchids that survive and thrive our confidence improves and we are willing to try different species. Perhaps we need to realize that Orchids have been on the earth for maybe 85,000,000 years, and they have some ability to survive even if our care is not perfect. Late spring brings a collection of miscellaneous orchids blooming. It was a treat to have two species of Leptotes blooming at the same time, Leptotes bicolor and Leptotes pohlitinocoi These small Brazilian members of the Cattleya tribe grow and bloom under the

same conditions outside in fairly bright sun. While you might get small plants in pots, I have found that they grow much better mounted, with little or no moss.

Now that the Australian Dendrobiums have pretty much finished, another group of hardy Australians is just coming into bloom. Sarcochilus hartmannii is making a nice display, and Sarcochilus fitzgeraldii is right behind. Sarco. hartmanii is mostly white with a bit of red surrounding the column, Sarco. fitzgeraldii has much more variation in the amount and shade of red. The ones with lots of red, of course, have been used extensively in hybridizing. The downside of Sarcochilus is that the flowers tend to not last much







more than a week or two, dropping when they still look fresh.

Odontoglossum spectactissimum lives up to its name, and has the advantage of rather long-lasting flowers, a characteristic of quite a few of the Oncidinae. Oncidium leucochilum has an intriguing combination of

colors and intricate form, and is also quite long-lasting.

Arpophyllum giganteum is also putting on a show. And a hum-

mingbird is nesting above my hanging Cattleyas, having re-worked last year's nest. I am hoping that they get together. Two beautiful jewels.
