Orchid Viruses—Introduction and Practical Aspects of Virus Testing

Dr. Kay Klausing

Kay Klausing was born in Germany and didn't start growing orchids until he was in college. The University of Konstanz where he got his Masters and PhD in Molecular Genetics had a lone Dendrobium kingianum specimen covering 2 huge baskets that had developed thousands of keikis due to being kept too warm. The gardener gave him a few keikis, He got hooked on orchids and after a few years most of his friends had D. kingianums (and he still has a division of that plant). He moved to the US in 1990 to do his postdoctoral work at UCSD and gave his collection to his dad who also got infected with the dreaded orchid virus (to his mom's dismay). One of the first things he bought in the US (before he even owned car) was an orchid at an orchid show by the Palomar Orchid Society. Since then his orchid collection has swelled to about 800 plants with an emphasis on the Cattleya alliance – almost exclusively species. He grows plants in three greenhouses (cool, intermediate and warm) and one outdoor area (rupicolous Laelias).

Kay was a member of the German Orchid Society for many years and is a long-term member of the AOS and serves on the board of their conservation committee. He is a member of the San Diego County Orchid Society which he now serves as 1st VP.

During his Masters and PhD work, he used a virus as a model system for replication and, as such, has had a long interest in and fascination with viruses. In the presentation he will give a brief introduction to orchid viruses, but will focus mainly on the practical aspects from the point of growing orchids. He will give a live demo on how to perform tests, share the test results for his collection and provide tips on how to prevent the spread of virus in a collection."

Host's Choice

We didn't have a speaker, so the selection of the "choice" plant fell to our gracious host, Scott McGregor. He is drawn to miniature orchids—that's how he gets so many lovely ones into his compact growing area. Scott selected Oncidium pumilum, brought by Roberta Fox, as his favorite. This plant has spotted leaves about 2" - 3" long, and the individual flowers are only about 1/8", but there are

lots of them clustered on the inflorescences. Roberta grows this plant outside, in a shady area that is watered by misters at least once per day (more in hot, dry weather)

Oncidium pumilum is native to much of Brazil, as well as parts of Argentina and Uruguay. According to Charles Baker in <u>Orchidwiz</u>, it is found at elevations from 1650— 2950 ft. (600-900 m) in swampy areas of subtopical rainforests. With its large geographical range, it clearly can adapt to a variety of temperature ranges, but does like water.

Editor's Potting Bench

First, I want to add my thanks to Scott for a fantastic visit. Here are a few photos. We had a great show-and-tell session along with being able to see Scott's VERY efficient growing area. With an enclosed shade house containing carnivorous plants, resident frogs, and occasional use of beneficial insects, he is able keep pests under control without the use of pesticides. The enclosure is open to the air (using mesh and shade cloth) so all the plants receive the full range of outdoor temperatures. People had to take turns, since there's not room for many at once, but everybody got a good look over the

course of the afternoon.

July is wild and crazy with respect to orchid-acquiring opportunities. Hopefully you got down to Sunset Valley Orchids on July 1. Then there's Andy's Orchids open house the next weekend, and the Santa Barbara nurseries (SBOE and Cal Orchid) the following weekend. A one week break, and then there's the Newport Harbor Orchid Society Orchid and Exotic Plant sale at Westminster Mall. Be sure that you save a LITTLE money and space for our auction in September as well as the September shows. If you are potting those overgrown orchids and you have divisions, we really need donations for the auction as well.

I read in various places that July is a "down month" for orchid bloom-







ing. Baloney. Maybe in some places it is, but in my yard, there is plenty of action. Sobralias are blooming vigoriously. Individual flowers don't last long, but growths bloom sequentially and there are lots of them. These won't come to meetings—they're too big to transport (and even smaller ones are in clay pots with rocks on the bottom so that they don't blow over in the wind). When I look at the various S. macrantha—S. xantholeuca hybrids, then

at the species, I wonder why anybody bothers to hybridize! S. macrantha and S. xantholeuca have more intense color than their hybrids, and for the softer combination of colors, S. sanderae is at least as lovely, and more predictable than the above-mentioned hybrids.

Lycastes of the section *aromaticae* (including Lyc. aromatica, Lyc. consobrina, and Lyc. cochleata among others) all bloom right about now on nearly leafless pseudobulbs. They look similar, but side by side one can see differences, and fragrances are also different.

For me, aromatica is done, but the other two are blooming copiously.

No more room for photos, but a few Laelia purpurata color forms, that seem to bloom later than the big flush of

them

(for me, werkhauseri, carnea, and sanguinea), are also putting on a show now. The secret to always having something in bloom is to buy blooming plants in different seasons. The summer sales are the perfect time to ensure that your yard (and these are all outdoor growers) is also ablaze .with orchids.


