## **Orchids of Bhutan**

Growing up in Minnesota, Sandra's only exposure to orchids was that prom corsage. After graduating with a degree in nursing, she moved to California and ended up in Santa Barbara. She began her orchid life as a pot washer for her husband Al and became fascinated with the history of her husband's complex Paph collection which included many of the oldies like Paph. F.C. Puddle. Al's knowledge, love, and enthusiasm for orchids were contagious and when they built a second greenhouse, she decided it would be hers and that was the moment that orchids became an important part of her life. Sandra is the president of the World Orchid Conference Trust, the immediate Past President of the American Orchid Society and chair of the AOS Education Committee. Sandra is an accredited judge in both the American Orchid Society and the Cymbidium Society of America judging systems and is treasurer of the AOS Pacific South Judging Center. She is the present Editor in Chief of the Orchid Digest. She was president of the Cymbidium Society of American and co-chair of the annual Cymbidium Society Congress. Locally, she has served on the boards and been president of the Orchid Society of Santa Barbara and the local branch of the Cymbidium Society. Sandra served on the board of the Santa Barbara International Orchid Show and, for several years, was the show manager. # Speaker's Choice

July speaker Kay Klausing admitted that he was especially fond of multifloral Paphiopedulums. He was drawn to the floriferous Paphiopedulum Iowii, grown by Richard Hess. Richard grows this plant in a greenhouse.

According to Charles and Marge Baker in <u>Orchidwiz</u>, Paph lowii grows on a number of islands in

Indonesia and on the Malay peninsula. It is found over a range of elevations from 2500-4500 ft (760-1300 m), in rather bright locations. While it appears to be epiphytic, lithophytic, or terrestrial, it actually just grows with roots in moss or pockets of humus on a variety of surfaces. It grows where the rainfall is heavy and there is plenty of moisture around.



# **Editor's Potting Bench**

After a frenetic July full of orchid events, August has turned quiet. I'm finding the best locations for my recent acquisitions, and looking around carefully for plants that need repotting. The weather is warm and likely to remain so for several more months, and plants are in active growth so it's a good time to wrap up the potting. I have most of the Catasetinae outside now. When they have all their leaves, they take up a lot of room in the greenhouse, they benefit from the outdoor light and air, and the nights are warm enough to not worry about the temper-





ature environment. My latest addition to the orchid-growing area in my yard is a reverse-osmosis unit. I look forward to being able to grow some of the more sensitive species that have languished over the years. After a month of using it, I see improvement in rapidly-growing species such as Sobralias, with new growth not showing the brown leaf tips that I have been used to. Stay tuned.

Last month several spectacular outdoor-growing Cattleya species frustratingly bloomed about three days after the meeting, and have now finished. At least, I can share them with you here. Cattleya schilleriana gave me three spectacular flowers this time. And Cattleya leopoldii was just a "wow!" I grow both of these hanging in an area with a polycarbonate hard cover. It's just enough protection in cold and rainy weather that they


seem do just fine outside. Not as spectacular, but reliable and robust is Cattleya forbesii. This species blooms two or three times a year, and does not get any particular protection. It is not only cold-tolerant, but has forgiven many beginner mistakes, since I have had the plant for many years. And it stays compact, another plus.

Stelis kefersteiniana is a cute little pleurothallid that is best appreciated in a photo, since the flowers are only about 1/4" making it hard to see the fuzzy detail.




Anguloa brevilabris is not going to come to a meeting. With pseudobulbs up to 7 inches tall and about 4 inches around, it's in a 12" basket. To accommodate the girth of the plant and give it room to grow without ending up with a huge lump of soggy sphagnum moss in the middle, I upended a plastic bulb pan in the middle of the basket and built up the moss around it. This makes an air pocket, and also helps to keep the weight down a bit. The flowers don't open fully, but are extremely fragrant. The genus is closely related to Lycaste, and it grows under the same shady, damp conditions.

Room for one more that is too big to carry very far. Epidendrum polyanthum lives in a 10 inch clay pot. It



seems to resent repotting. When I repotted it, it sulked for several years. The bark has essentially all broken down and washed out of the pot As the pot emptied itself of media, I started to get a few flowers again. So I just let it go. It reblooms on old spikes, so I don't cut anything that isn't brown and crispy. This is the best blooming of this plant that I have had in many years.
