Cattleya Species and Their Culture

Peter T. Lin

Peter Lin will be presenting his newest talk: Cattleva Species and Their Culture. Cattleyas have been grown for many years and there are now thousands of hybrids. Before hybrids, species were first grown. Learn about the many different species and some of their culture requirements. This fast paced PowerPoint presentation will discuss most of the Cattleya species. Peter will also discuss some of the challenges in repotting these orchids.

Peter started growing orchids over 30 years ago, but then stopped due to school and

starting a career. It wasn't until about 12 years ago that the orchid "bug" came back and he is now heavily involved once again. He is an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society and a hybridizer of mini-catts. He enjoys meeting with other orchid enthusiasts, and can often be found at various orchid shows and societies around the country. Due to limited growing space, Peter likes to specialize in miniature orchids, both species and hybrids, and has received numerous AOS awards. His other interests in orchids include Dendrobiums, Angraecoids, and Neofinetias. He maintains a collection of a thousand or

in 3 small greenhouses, as well as in the house under fluorescent lights.

Speaker's Choice

June speaker Arthur Pinkers selected Pleurothallis viduata, grown by Roberta Fox, as his Speaker's Choice plant. Roberta grows this plant outside, somewhat shady. It currently gets reverse osmosis water, but it did fine with city water for several years. Clearly, it's less picky than many pleurothallids. Each growth produces flowers in succession, ,so that the plant is in bloom most of the time. Since emerging flowers look rather similar to spent inflorescences, it's important to not be aggressive about "cleaning" old ones. Eventually the spent ones dry up, become brittle, and easily break off. Otherwise, just leave them and enjoy the flowers.

Pleurothallis viduata is found in Ecuador, at elevations of about 2800 meters. However, however it seems to tolerate warm summer days as well as cool winter nights.

We anticipate that we will spend down most of the treasury by the end of December, 2018, and whatever is remaining will be donated to non-profit, orchid related organization(s) as determined by the Board of Directors.

Editor's Potting Bench

I spent the last couple of weeks in the Galapagos, a place with fantastic geology and fauna, though few orchids (none where I was) It's an amazing evolutionary laboratory, with a time scale much shorter than in most other places, since the archipelago is very new (and very volcanic). However, I wasn't the only one traveling... Tim Roby was fortunate to see Cypripedium parviflorum blooming in Canada. He sent these photos from Fort Whyte in Manitoba. These have become quite rare due both to habitat loss and poaching. (Sadly, the poached ones don't survive away from their native habitat, being extremely dependent on the very specific soil mycorrhizae where they grow)

I came home to a yard ablaze with blooming orchids, nearly all of which have stayed in bloom for me to enjoy. Laelia purpuratas are popping all over the place. This is a species with so many color forms that one always can accommodate one more.... or several more. Some can be grouped, or maybe they are just different names for the same thing. The color forms have no botanical standard, so f. roxo-violeta and f. shusteriana may have subtle differences, or not. Some other forms are more distinct. f. russelliana is a soft pink and I find it quite lovely. Here are a few of the L. purpurata blooms of the moment.



In no particular order, here are a few more orchids of interest that greeted me, all living outdoors. Microcoelia stolzii is completely leafless, photosynthesizing through its roots. It grows very nicely outside, in a damp, shady corner. Oncidium phymatochilum has an inflorescence like a fluffy



cloud of flowers. This is the season when the yellow-green Lycastes bloom on bare pseudobulbs, perhaps with new leaves just starting. Lyc. aromatica has finished, Lyc. consobrina is in in full bloom, and Lyc. cochleata is not quite open yet (but might be for the meeting) These look very similar, but looking at them (or their photos) side by side one can see differences. Just one more, Masdevallia infracta

Also blooming in profusion are the Sobralias. Many are hybrids, but two of the dominant parent species are also in bloom. The individual flowers only last two days or less, but they bloom successively so I will be enjoying them for at least another six weeks, maybe more.
