LOCATION FOR THE MAY MEETING: THE HOME OF BARBARA OLSON

Directions to Barbara's House

From the 57 freeway, get off at Lambert. Go west (if coming from the south, go left under the freeway bridge). Stay on Lambert to Puente St. There is a gas station on the northwest corner. (Major streets before Puente are Brea Blvd, then Berry) Turn right on Puente St. Pass one signal, and continue up the hill. The second stop sign is Whittier Blvd. There is a statue of a woman stretching on your right. Keep going, Barb's house is the third one on the right past the statue, a long redwood house with lots of foliage in front.

Speaker's Choice

April speaker Rich Walton selected *Phalaenopsis wilsonii*, grown by Peter Lin, as his favorite from a jam-packed Show and Tell table. This small, but dramatic plant is grown mounted, and is mostly roots. There is only a single leaf, but when wet, the green roots show that they are the primary photosynthetic powerhouse. The plant can lose even that single leaf, be quite healthy, and grow another one in the next season. The flower is fragrant.

Phalaenopsis wilsonii is native to western China and eastern Tibet, at elevations from approximately 4920 to 7000 ft. Peter grows his in a warm greenhouse (and the plant is clearly quite happy that way) but according to the

Baker culture sheet in Orchidwiz, it can encounter temperatures from 84 degrees F down to 25 degrees F. in its native habitat. With such low temperatures, it certainly would be deciduous, and go dormant. In cultivation, it flowers better if kept warmer, so that it does not lose all its leaves.

During the growing season, it wants high humidity and plenty of water. In the winter, watering can be reduced. In nature, it also encounters higher light levels in winter, since cloud cover is reduced. In cultivation, a moderate rest should be sufficient to mimic its natural pattern while keeping the plant healthy. Peter certainly has found the right balance.

Editor's Potting Bench

The difference between an "easy—to—grow" orchid species and a difficult one is, in a nutshell, the amount of effort to which one must go to obtain the conditions that the plant wants. For many of them, we manage to arrive at a compromise between what the orchid gets in its natural habitat and what we can achieve for it in "captivity". There aren't many orchid species native to California, and most of those are even more picky—we can't offer winter frost or special mycorrhizae that might be found in the mountains. I have found one, though, that is proving to fall into the category of "easy".

Epipactis gigantea (the "giant stream orchid") grows over a large area of the western United States. It likes streams, bogs, and "seeps", including those that it finds in the canyons of southern California. It even grows by springs in the Mojave

desert! Unlike most of the native orchids, it can be readily grown from seed, and I managed to obtain one from Tree of Life Nursery, a native-plant nursery near San Juan Capistrano.

When I got in February, it was just a few dead stalks in a gallon pot. However, about a month later, little green shoots started to appear. Now, at the end of April, it has started to bloom! That's not much more than a month from the appearance of growth to the emergence of flowers! While most of the California native orchids are very small, and many are rather undistinguished-looking, this one is colorful, and the flowers are about 1 inch wide. I'll bring the plant to the May meeting, but share it here for those who don't get to see it in person.

The leaves are soft, and there is no pseudobulb. The flowers open somewhat sequentially. The plant

goes dormant in the winter, but since it's a "native", it does not expect to dry out when that happens. After all, winter is when it rains in California, so that is what it expects. Indeed, too much drying is likely to drive it into "permanent dormancy".

It came to me in a light soil containing a fair amount of humus, and that is what it would be likely to find in its native habitat. I added some azalea mix to fill the pot into which I transferred it, which seems to be appropriate. It would experience leaf-litter, which tends to be a bit on the acidic side. I grow it in open shade. While in the desert it would get full sun, I think that in the Orange County canyons where it grows, it's fairly shady. Also, it's easier to keep it moist with a little shade, and for all of its habitats, plenty of water is the common denominator.
