Note the earlier starting time. We will have lots of outstanding plants and orchid-related items for you to buy. This is the principal source of funds for the society — the proceeds support the speaker programs for the year. Come early to preview the plants, and then BID BID and go home with some wonderful treasures.

Speaker's Choice

September speaker Nico Goosens selected Sobralia macrantha, grown by Dorothy Goldberg, as his choice. This species is a wonderful outdoor-growing orchid. Dorothy's plant was beautifully grown and groomed, with lush, clean foliage and those magnificent pink-purple flowers. This plant was just barely portable, in a 3-gallon pot. Many of us have Sobralias, but they're just too big to bring to a meeting. So special thanks go to Dorothy for wrestling this plant into the car and sharing it with us.

Sobralia macrantha is native to a very large area of central and southern Mexico and Central America to Costa Rica. It grows in a very wide range of habitats and at elevations from around 150 ft to 10,000 ft. Plants grow in leaf litter on rocky outcroppings, in tree crotches, in forest debris, in sandy soil along stream banks, in wet soil in ravines, and on rocky canyon walls (Charles Baker, in Orchidwiz) In short, in its natural range, it grows under just about any conditions. That makes it a fantastic backyard plant.

While it can grow epiphytically, it is mostly terrestrial. It grows well in a fairly moisture-retentive mix, and kept moist. Sobralias don't like their roots disturbed, and so

when one outgrows its pot, just put it in a bigger one without trying to untangle the root ball. It can bloom more than once a year, though primary blooming is either early summer or late summer into fall. The flowers only last a



few days, but a growth will produce several flowers in succession. When the floral bracts turn brown and it is clear that blooming is done on a growth, it can be trimmed, but don't be too hasty.

This month, I have a few comments that I hope will whet your appetite for the auction. I have been compiling the pre-registered donations as they come in, so that we can provide a good preliminary list for you to drool over. Be sure to check our website often in the days immediately before the auction, to see some of what we will have. (Don't just look at the end of the list for new things – several members have asked for labels to pre-register their donations, and those numbers will appear in the numerical sequence when we get them.

The publisher of Orchidwiz has generously donated a copy of the latest update of the software to our auction. This is a \$300 package, and one lucky bidder will go

home with it, probably getting a real bargain. I seem to be acquiring a reputation as one who knows something about orchid species, their names, classifications, and sometimes growing conditions. Well, I'm a "backyard grower", just like many of you. I have greatly improved my success rate by being able to quickly obtain information about the plants that I buy, so that I can give them something close to the conditions that they need (and stay away from the ones that I can't possibly do that for). For the most part, Orchidwiz is my reference. For the majority of the species that I acquire, there is a Baker Reference Sheet available, and those alone are

worth the "price of admission" to me. Even for most of the obscure ones, there is at least temperature and location information. Then, there are the thousands of photos, from some of the top species collectors and photographers, to help with IDs. For hybrids (yes, most of us grow lots of those too) this tool is even more important. The growing conditions for a hybrid are typically something close to an average of the species that make it up. Orchidwiz gives you that information, and calculates a very good estimate of the cultural requirements for each one. It also "translates" the currently accepted genus names into the more familiar ones, and lists all of the synonyms by which a plant may have been known, permitting you to look them up based

on the tag that you may have, even though the name has gone through multiple changes. The taxonomic changes aren't likely to settle down any time soon, so having a good cross-reference is a sanity-

saver. As for photos... approaching the 100,000 mark I think. This includes award photos from Brazil (think Cattleya and Laelia especially), Taiwan (Phalaenopsis and Vanda especially), South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Germany, and probably some others that I have forgotten. If you don't have a computer, my condolences... If you do (Windows or Windows emulator) you need this. Be sure to bid on this one!

For those of you that visited my place for the Mother's Day meeting a year and a half ago, or some other time, you might recall my Cyrtochilum falcipetalum with its spike that reached, then ran along the shadecloth. At a couple of points where it bumped into the "roof" it grew a keiki. When the spike was truly done, and the keikis started rooting well, I clipped them off and potted them. They took off beautifully, with lots of good roots. One of those keikis will be on the auction table. I'm waiting for a new spike on the mother plant, but when it appears. I'm ready for it this time... a tomato cage. I have also seen these "controlled" by winding the spike in a circle between two stakes. So, it doesn't really need to have 12-15 feet of free wandering room, though it is certainly lovely when it grows that way. Think of it as an "Oncidium on steroids". Flowers are about 3" across. Bid, bid, bid!!! See you at the auction.
