Speaker's Choice

September speaker Peter Tobias picked Laelia alaorii, grown by Roberta Fox, as his Speaker's Choice. The plant was small, with one charming, fragrant flower certainly not as spectacular as many on the show-and-tell table. Peter selected it because it was part of the "back story" of his exploration of the Serra Bonita Reserve in Brazil, the topic of his talk. He said that he nearly stepped on a fallen branch with blooming Laelia alaorii plants. They were not listed on the spreadsheet of species that had been found in the reserve—they normally grow in trees 60 ft or

more above ground level, and had not been noticed.

L. alaorii grows in a relatively small area of the Brazilian Atlantic rainforest. According to Charles Baker in Orchidwiz, it has been found around 1600 ft (500 m). Although this is a relatively low altitude, and in an area that is generally rather warm, it clearly can tolerate cooler temperatures. Roberta grows this plant on a small mount, outside all year around. It receives filtered sun and at least daily watering.

Editor's Potting Bench

A fringe benefit of being the "data manager" for the auction is that I get an advance preview of what we are going to be selling. There are still a lot of items that have not yet been picked up or recorded, and the list is already impressive. I will be posting a preliminary list of auction items on the website, starting approximately Wednesday, October 9 (or sooner if the items picked up in San Diego get logged before then). I will then update the list as additional items are received, so do check several times before the auction to build your "wish list".

I am writing this the day after the end of Fascination of Orchids. It is nice to sit down for a little bit after a weekend on my feet. However, much of today was spent potting and mounting those interesting bare-root species orchids that followed me home. Still to be potted is that 12' Sobralia mandonii that I just had to have., since it is climbing out of its 15" pot. Tomorrow's project. When it blooms, I'll share photos in this space. I will not bring it to a meeting, I guarantee.

This is a tricky time of year for the orchids. The "monsoon season" seems to finally be over, giving way to bone-dry Santa Ana winds and wild temperature swings. Nights are starting to be chilly. About two more weeks, and it will be time to consider protecting some of the more tender plants, and the lows head toward 50 deg. F. Remember that a dry orchid will tolerate cold better than a wet one, therefore consider watering in the morning so that things are dry by nightfall.

In the rest of this column I will share some of my blooming orchids that will probably not make it to November, the next opportunity for Show and Tell. In fact, the inspiration for the "virtual show and tell" photos on the website was the large number of species that bloom in October, therefore can't be shared in person.

I am totally delighted by Habenaria medusa. This plant goes completely dormant in the winter, after it has

bloomed. It is one of those that must receive little or no water until the new growth appears. I do give it some heavy misting about every two weeks while it is dormant. If does need to grow in the greenhouse.

One of my most reliable plants is Arpophyllum alpinum. It has no problem with winter cold. It grows in nearly full sun. The bright magenta flowers attract hummingbirds, but do not seem to get pollinated by them. The flowers don't last very long, but the plant produces new spikes over a period of several weeks.

Haraella retrocalla is a charming little Vandaceous species that clearly mimics an insect. It is quite coldtolerant. It has done better for me outside than it did in the greenhouse., and after going through two winters, I think I can safely say that it can handle considerable cold. It is very fragrant.

This is the best blooming I have ever had of Tricopilia rostrata. At the time of the photo, there were six inflorescences, with two or three flowers each, and at least two more spike on their way. This plant usually blooms twice a year. It grows in the greenhouse.

Spiranthes odorata is native to most of the southeastern United States. It goes somewhat dormant in the winter but does not lose all its leaves, and I don't hold back on the water. It has no problem with our win-
