
Rupiculous Laelias of Brazil

Tom Biggart is the owner and head grower of GRANITE HILLS ORCHIDS IN El Cajon, California(a small town 15 miles east of San Diego). His nursery is a hobby business which means he doesn't make a living growing plants. It is more of a labor of love! Tom loves plants in general, and orchids are his main passion. The past few years he and his wife, Neal, have gotten interested in Ceramics. In typical Biggart fashion they now have a throwing building, a glazing building, and a kiln yard with 3 kilns. His pottery is designed primarily for plants and can be seen at most of the local orchid shows and at the nursery. He would love to talk orchids and pottery with anyone interested!

Speaker's Choice

December speaker Tim Culbertson selected Mystacidium venosum, grown by Peter Lin, as his Speaker's Choice because he loves little Angraecoids, and this one is beautifully grown. Peter grows this one in a greenhouse that gets down to 45 deg. F at night. He suspects that this plant would do fine outside, especially in more temperate areas closer to the coast. He does grow the related species Mystacidium braeboniae and Mystacidium capense outside.

According to Charles Baker, in <u>Orchidwiz</u>, Mystacidium venosum grows in a wide variety of habitats in South

Africa and neighboring countries. It grows in hot, humid forests at sea level, and cooler mountains up to 4900 ft. (1500 m), as far south as the Cape, and north to Swaziland, near the Tropic of Capricorn. It also grows both in shaded and more exposed areas. It does like humidity, but needs to dry out, and had a rambling growth habit, so grows well mounted. This genus has prolific roots, and small leaves.

Editor's Potting Bench

Winter has finally put in appearance. The more tender orchids are safely tucked in the greenhouse, and the other 90 percent will persevere, as they always do. A very pleasant activity for a chilly winter evening is to curl up with a good book, and a special one has come to my attention (and then to my bookshelf), Orchids of Tropical America: An Introduction and Guide by Joe E. Meisel (Vice President of the Ceiba Foundation for Tropical Conservation), Ronald S. Kaufmann (UCSD professor, Director on the Board of the Orchid Conservation Alliance, and friend of, and sometime speaker at, our Society), and Franco Pupulin (Orchid Curator at the Lankester Botanical Garden in San José, Costa Rica) Each genus is described, identifying characteristics that distinguish it. The discussion includes information about the name (often with delightful wit, e.g. "The genus Dracula is named not for the Transylvanian plasma connoisseur but rather for the little dragons whose faces the flowers resemble...."), a bit on the habitat, and a discussion about the history, ecology, and challenges faced by the plants of the genus. A few species for each are illustrated as examples, since it would be impossible to cover very many of them within the scope of a very portable volume. Ron Kaufmann and Andy Phillips contributed many of the photos. Behind the succinct summaries there is an immense depth of knowledge possessed by the authors, so that within a very small space for each genus there is a wealth of information that is a pleasure to read. It is available on Amazon.com.

Take a look at the Events page of this Newsletter. We are moving into a very busy season for orchid events. The Orange County Orchid Society auction always has a huge selection of wonderful plants. Also in January there will be liquidation sale of plants of the Rowland Collection. Many of the Cymbidiums are in spike or in bloom. Pat Rowland's

breeding program was directed toward small and miniature Cymbidiums, so there are many plants that are floriferous in 1-gallon pots, great for those with limited space. (I don't know anybody whose space ISN'T limited...) Along with the Cymbidiums, there are Catts, Paphs, and other groups. You will not hear "That one is not for sale"... All are for sale. February we'll discuss in the next newsletter... there will be lots of activity coming up.

With cooler weather, I think many orchids are breathing a sigh of relief. Cliesocentron merrillianum blooms several times a year. It produces new growths, and each of those has the potential for another group of slate-blue flowers. At the moment, my plant has two groups of flowers and another just starting, that will probably open about the time that

the first bunch fades. This Vandaceous species grows outside easily. An interesting note, when I brought this plant in for Show and Tell in August, the color was much paler, no doubt due to the heat.

Not quite so blue, but more of the classic coerulea is Cochleanthes wailesiana. This one does better in the greenhouse. Individual flowers don't last all that long, but it produces several of them at a time, and then produces some more in a month or two. It is lightly

fragrant.

A delightful little Pleurothallid that does not seem to care about the weather (bloomed in the August heat,




and is blooming now in the late December cold) is Restrepea cuprea. Individual flowers don't last long but there are quite a few of them, so maybe it will be cooperative at meeting time.

Dendrochilum cobbianum is just finishing for me. Greenhouse-grown plants bloomed earlier, but, as is often the case, the ones grown outside are delayed a bit. Dendrochilum javieriense is just getting started. Now, if it will just open more than one spike at a time to make a nice display...

Winter is an adventure because prediction is difficult—we have all had the experience of buds, that look ready to open, just sit there when the weather turns cold. I'm looking forward to seeing what YOU have blooming for the meeting.
