## Oncidium leucochilum Curtis Gean

We welcome the return of Curtis Gean and his new talk.

Curtis is a semi-retired photographer/videographer living in Sanger, CA (about 15 miles from Fresno). He developed his interest in orchids in the '60s. He became an accredited AOS judge in 1986 but became inactive in the judging program due to living in Mexico for 10 years, and lost his accreditation. Upon his return, he plunged back into the judging program, and had to serve yet another seven-year apprenticeship to get it back. He received his accreditation as an AOS judge (for the second time) in 2013. This is what he says about his talk:

"During my "re-training" as a Judge, I had to prepare a presentation on how certain species influence the hybrids. I chose Oncidium leucochilum as my subject. The research that I did for the presentation gave me the idea to share my findings with others.

I also have an interest in other species in the Oncidinae alliance... and how the renaming of many of the species has cause a great deal of confusion, and necessitat-

ed the changing of many hybrid names, names that have been in common usage for decades.

One such species is Baptistonia echinata, [now known as Gomesa echinata], and what would result in using this species as a hybrid parent. A few photos might give you an idea."

## **Speaker's Choice**

June speaker Ron Kaufmann selected a beautifully grown Cleisocentron merrillanum grown by Jan Hennessey. Jan grows this in an outdoor shade area. It is possible that it may actually be Cleisocentron gokusingii... the two species are very close, only with a little different flower presentation. We'll go with the tag, Clctn. merrillianum. The color is very rare in the orchid world (or for that matter, among plants in general) It is truly blue—sort of a slate blue. The intensity of color may vary in blooming at different times of the year, being influenced by temperature and light. The plant may bloom two or three times per year. This is a particularly good blooming!

According to Jay Pfahl's website www.orchidcpecies.com, Cleisocentron merrillianum is found only in Sabah, Borneo. It grows in the crowns of large, mossy trees at elevations from 3600 ft to 9800 ft (1100—3000 m). It was discovered relatively recently, being described by Eric Christenson in 1992. It clearly can grow over a wide range of temperatures. That something so unusual and beautiful was only known to science for less than 25 years tells us that there are other wonderful species still undiscovered, making habitat preservation and maintenance a critical priority, lest we lose some before we even know about them.

## **Editor's Potting Bench**

The way to always have something in bloom is to buy blooming plants at different seasons of the year. The traditional show seasons are spring and fall, but in summer we have another burst of activity. The weekend of the meeting you could go to Andy's on Friday and Santa Barbara on Saturday (or vice versa) and still make it to our meeting on Sunday! Take a break for a week, and there's the Newport Harbor Orchid and Exotic Plant Sale at Westminster Mall. All of those are probably cooler than where you live (Santa Barbara and Encinitas are on the coast, the mall is air conditioned)

Laelia purpurata season has been going on for a month or so, and the earlier ones are done. But there are some varieties that tend to bloom later, such as carnea, sanguinea, and alba. In the meantime, the L. tenebrosas are getting started (earliest ones already open, the peak approaching rapidly.)

Keeping plants hydrated is a challenge as the summer warms up. As long as the humidity stays up it's not so bad, but still (fortunately for us, not so much for the orchids) it's not the tropics. The rule that the various water districts maintain of watering between

5 PM and 8 AM makes a lot of sense, whether their days do or not. Water applied during the day evaporates too quickly. A spritz in the middle of the day may help keep plants from overheating, but the important watering is in the evening or early morning. Evening is best (that is what happens in the tropics) since the plants have the whole night to absorb water before the sun comes up in the morning. With nights staying well above 65 deg. F, there is no worry about botrytis or crown rot. By applying water when it will be absorbed best by the plants, we can simultaneously save water



and benefit the orchids.

Many Sobralias are blooming vigorously. Along with Sob. macrantha, Sob. xantholeuca and their hybrids, there are some very nice species that are not so well-known. Sobralia sanderae flowers have a soft yellow blush on the petals, the little pink streak on the midribs gives a nice accent, and while some of the usual hybrids may be similar, they aren't reliably so. The species is so pretty, are the hybrids in this group an improvement? Size is about the same as Sob. macrantha and its hybrids, it grows under the same conditions. Another nice one, that seems to want more shade and is perhaps a bit trickier, is Sobralia violacea. Well worth branching out! You won't



often see Sobralias at meetings since they tend to be a bit large to transport. All the more reason to populate your yard with them.

Macroclinium manabinum is a charming miniature in the Oncidium alliance. Flowers are only about 1/4" across, so the intricate detail is really better appreciated in a photograph. This one needs to grown a bit warmer, but it could be easily accommodated in a terrarium or similar environment. It blooms multiple times on the same spike, so don't cut them until they are brown and clearly done. I typically get three sequential sets of flowers on an inflorescence over several months.
