Speaker's Choice(s)

April speaker Norman Fang just could not make just one choice from a very full Show and Tell table. So we said he could pick two... we stopped him at 3. Since we don't have a speaker, there is space to talk a bit about all of them. As a Phalaenopsis specialist, he stopped first at Phalaenopsis stuartiana, grown by Roberta Fox. He noted that this was the cultivar 'Sogo', which came originally from his nursery (about six years ago). This year it produced a particularly prolific bloom. Roberta grows this in the greenhouse, and has found that this, as well as other Phalaenopsis species, seem to grow best in wood baskets with minimal medium (essentially mounted). The basket is hung sideways, so that the growth pattern is similar to what is found in nature, and this removes the possibility that water might collect in the crown. This species is native to the Philippines. Along with the spotted flowers (cultivars vary from few or no spots on the segments to dramatic ones like this) the species has very

attractive mottled leaves.

Norman then moved on to the prolific Dendrobium miyakei, grown by Jan Hennessey. Jan grows this outdoors in Costa Mesa. While this species is listed as a synonym for Dendrobium goldschmidtianaum, it is at the very least, from a higherelevation population. Dendrobium goldschmidtianum is a warm grower, while Den. miyakei grows readily outdoors, at least near the coast, and tolerates our cool winter nights just fine. It

blooms repeatedly on leafless canes, so it is important to NOT cut anything that isn't shriveled and dry. It also blooms several times a year. The species is indigenous to the Philippines, and also has been found on Taiwan.

Then, Norman also selected Bulbophyllum

(Cirrhopetalum) taiwanense, grown by Darrell Lovell. Darrell got this plant from Andy's Orchids in 2016, and this is its first (and very spectacular)



bloom. Darrell grows this plant in his greenhouse, in bright light. It gets watered every day, letting it dry out a bit. All of his mounted Bulbophyllums get a weak solution of 20-20-20 fertilizer with each watering, and they seem to like it.

This species comes from southern Taiwan, in forests on tree trunks below 1000 m (3000 ft) (*Internet Orchid Species Photo Encyclopedia,* <u>www.orchidspecies.com</u>)

lief from the heat that we have experienced. Higher humidity and temperate days make happy plants. Nights are now warm enough that most of the orchids that needed winter protection can go back outside.

There is lots of "flower activity" in my back yard (and I suspect, in yours). The orchids seem to know when there is no meeting to show them off, and they are laughing... I'll share a few here. Cattleya mossiae var. semi-alba is not only beautiful, but quite fragrant. I give it some overhead protection from rain (in case we get any) but otherwise does fine outside. Cattleya aurantiaca also grows well outside. Along with the typical orange form, there is also a yellow one, and an orange one with spots.

Also in the Cattleya group is the genus Leptotes. Here are Leptotes bicolor and Leptotes pohlitinacoi (pohlitinaco-I, named for two Brazilian orchid enthusiasts.)



Polystachya is an African genus, most members of which grow on the warm side. Polystachya campyloglossa bloomed for the first time for me. Also, "old

reliable" Polystachya paniculata also is blooming nicely.

Dendrobium scoriarum, a species from China, grows outside. It needs to be kept drier in winter, and blooms on leafless canes. Flowers are only an inch wide or less, but I think they are rather dramatic.
